Words of Welcome (Please stand as clergy enters)

In the season of Advent we have used the Advent wreath and its candles to help us get ready for this great celebration of the birth of Christ, and so we have lit the candles of hope, peace, joy and love.

Today we celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ, a love incarnate which fulfils promises of old and demonstrates God's love for all. (Christmas candle of advent wreath is lit)

Let us pray,

Holy God, you wonderfully created and yet more wonderfully restored our human nature. May we share the divine life of your Son Jesus Christ, who humbled himself to share our humanity, and now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

O Come All Ye Faithful

O come, all ye faithful, joyful and triumphant, O come ye, O come ye to Bethlehem; come and behold him born the king of angels: O come, let us adore him, Christ the Lord.

Sing, choirs of angels, sing in exultation, sing, all ye citizens of heaven above; glory to God in the highest: O come, let us adore him, Christ the Lord.

See how the shepherds, summoned to his cradle, leaving their flocks, draw nigh with lowly fear; we too will thither bend our joyful footsteps; O come, let us adore him, Christ the Lord.

Yea, Lord, we greet thee, born this happy morning; Jesus, to thee be glory given; Word of the Father, now in flesh appearing: O come, let us adore him, Christ the Lord.

The Story of Our Faith

Reader (*Mavis Pillar*): In the days of Herod the King, the Angel Gabriel was sent from God to the city of Nazareth. To a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, and the virgin's name was Mary. And the Angel said unto her: 'Hail, the Lord is with you. Blessed are you among women.'

And when she saw the angel, she was troubled. The Angel said: 'fear not Mary; for you have found favour with God. You shall bring forth a son and call his name Jesus.'

It came to pass that Caesar Augustus decreed that all the world should be taxed, everyone to his own city. So Joseph went from Nazareth to the city of Bethlehem, and Mary, his wife, was great with child.

And so it was that, while they were there, the day came that she should deliver her baby. And she brought forth her firstborn son and wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn.

Away in a manger

Away in a manger, no crib for a bed, the little Lord Jesus laid down his sweet head. The stars in the bright sky looked down where he lay, the little Lord Jesus asleep in the hay.

The cattle are lowing, the baby awakes, but little Lord Jesus no crying he makes. I love you, Lord Jesus, look down from on high and stay by my cradle until morning is nigh.

Be near me, Lord Jesus: I ask you to stay close by me forever, and love me, I pray. Bless all the dear children in your tender care, and fit us for heaven, to live with you there.

Reader (*Rhonda Koch*): There were in the same country, shepherds in the field, keeping watch over their flocks by night. When, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them and the glory of the Lord shone around them and they were very afraid. And the angel said: 'fear not, for I bring you tidings of great joy. For unto you is born this day, in the city of David, a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign; you shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger.' And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God.

When the angels were gone, the shepherds said to one another, 'Let us go to Bethlehem to see this thing which is come to pass.' And they came with haste, and found Mary and Joseph, and the babe lying in a manger.

And behold, there came wise men to Jerusalem saying, 'where is he that is born King of the Jews? For we have seen his star and have come to worship him.' And lo, the star, which they saw in the East, went before them, till it stood over where the young child was. As Jesus was born in a manger because there was no room for them in the inn; be especially present with those who have nowhere to lay their head, those who are vulnerable, and those who are hungry. Lord, in your mercy,

Hear our prayer.

As the Holy Family gathered together in Bethlehem, and travelled together to far off lands; protect those who travel. Please bless all families, especially the families of our parish, those who could gather and, because of Covid, those who could not. Lord, in your mercy, **Hear our prayer.**

As your son came to proclaim the forgiveness of sins, and the assurance of life eternal; give to the departed, eternal rest and let light perpetual shine on them. Lord, in your mercy, **Hear our prayer.**

O Lord our God, may the Light and Hope of this night, and of your Son's Incarnation, reassure our hearts that you are among us, that you hear our prayer, and that you will be with us always, even to the end of the age. In the name of Jesus of Nazareth, we pray. **Amen.**

The Celebration of the Eucharist

<u>Prayer of over the Gifts</u> (Tune: What Can I give Him?) What can I give him, poor as I am? If I were a shepherd I would bring a lamb. If I were a wise man, I would do my part;

Yet what can I give him; give him my heart.

Eucharistic Prayer (Please stand)

The Lord be with you. And also with you.

Lift up your hearts. **We lift them to the Lord**.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of heaven and earth, because in the mystery of the Word made flesh you have caused a new light to shine in our hearts, to give knowledge of salvation in the face of your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Now with angels and archangels and the whole company of heaven, we lift our voices to proclaim the glory of your name.

(Tune: Hark the Herald Angels Sing Melody) Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might adored heaven and earth are shining bright with the glory of your light.

Loud hosannas now we sing! In the highest may they ring! Blessed is the coming one, Christ, Emmanuel, your Son. Glory in the highest! Holy God, your name be blessed.

Holy God, source of life and goodness, all creation rightly gives you praise. In the fullness of time, you sent your Son Jesus Christ, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He healed the sick and ate and drank with outcasts and sinners; he opened the eyes of the blind and proclaimed the good news of your kingdom to the poor and to those in need. In all things he fulfilled your gracious will.

On the night he freely gave himself to death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: this is my body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Gracious God, his perfect sacrifice destroys the power of sin and death; by raising him to life you give us life for evermore.

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith.

(Tune: We Three Kings)

Dying Christ destroyed our death. Rising Christ restores our life. Christ will come again in glory, raising us all to life. Oh, God of power, God of might, God of love, our hearts delight: Feed us, guide us, walk beside us, bless us with gentle light.

Recalling his death, proclaiming his resurrection, and looking for his coming again in glory, we offer you, Father, this bread and this cup. Send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon these gifts, that all who eat and drink at this table may be one body and one holy people, a living sacrifice in Jesus Christ, our Lord. Through Christ, with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory is yours, almighty Father, now and for ever.

The Lord's Prayer

And now, with the words our Saviour Christ has taught us, we are bold to say:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Breaking of the Bread

We break the bread of life, and that life is the light of the world God here among us, light in the midst of us, bring us to light and life. (Tune Infant Holy Infant Lowly) God our Mother, Christ our Brother, Spirit in these gifts you vow By your giving, in our living, we become your body now Bread is broken, light revealing; word is spoken for our healing Make us all your body now. Amen. Amen.

The table of love is offered for all people. It is Christ who invites us to meet love incarnate here, and all are welcome.

The gifts of God for the people of God. **Thank be to God.**

The Communion

(Communion will be offered from a standing position in front of the choir pews. It will be offered in one kind (bread only). It is the belief within the Anglican Church that receiving in one kind is considered full communion. If receiving, please walk single file on the right to the front. Remove mask and sanitize your hands just prior to receiving and re-mask to return to your seat. Responses to receiving the host include: Amen: Hallelujah; or Thanks be to God.)

Candle lighting

As the light of love shines in the darkness so a candle's light shows the love of God to the world. And now, we'd like to invite you to light a candle.

Candles are lit by passing the light on from one to the other along the pew. Please hold the lit candle upright and tip only the unlit candle to prevent wax from dripping. Once all the candles are lit, we will dim the lights and sing. We will then hold silence for a few moments.

(Please <u>do not blow out</u> your candles. Candles <u>will be snuffed out</u>. As the light of the candle is extinguished, we say)

May God's love live in your heart and shine in your life.

Blessing

May the true spirit of Christmas be with us all the spirit of joy that overflows from the heart and makes neighbours rejoice, the spirit of peace that harmonises differences and makes music of our common life. the spirit of love that sings the mind of God to the world.

And may the blessing of the manger – God's creation all around; the blessing of the shepherds – God's people on the ground; the blessing of the angels – good news for all, and peace for the world, be among us, and remain with us, always.

Joy to the World

Joy to the world! The Lord is come: let earth receive the King; let every heart prepare him room, and heaven and nature sing.

Joy to the earth! The Saviour reigns: let us glad songs employ, while fields and floods, rocks, hills, and plains repeat the sounding joy.
